Message from the Chief Executive

I am delighted to announce that SAWIA has reached agreement with the South Australian government for the **joint funding of a Wine Industry Sector Agreement that builds on the success of the initial agreement** that had been completed by SAWIA last year. The new Sector Agreement will allow measurement of the wine sector's carbon footprint to continue, as well as exploring the potential for savings through an energy efficiency program. This project will commence shortly, with details to follow in next month's newsletter.

This announcement follows on from SAWIA's April newsletter which reported that SAWIA had successfully secured **significant funding from the Australian Packaging Covenant** to take SAWIA's Mentor Program to a whole new level. This announcement, in turn, followed on from March's major success with the **State Government agreeing to provide SAWIA with funding of \$250,000 per annum over 4 years** to increase the domestic and international sales of wine and develop new and existing markets. Together, these key projects create significant opportunities for SAWIA members to improve profitability and sustainability.

Protecting the land upon which agriculture can productively operate is of key importance to our wine industry. **The South Australian Government's announcement that it will be issuing a discussion paper as a precursor to the development of a Bill should encourage SAWIA members to find strong voice!** With the WA wine industry battling protection in Margaret River and critics emerging about the legislative protection afforded to the Swan Valley region, it is critical to ensure the South Australian wine industry's views are heard. If we needed any further encouragement, the Australian Bureau of Statistics has recently reported the diminishing supply of agricultural land today stands at 52% of Australia's land mass down from 65% some 35 years ago. SAWIA will continue to strongly represent members on this issue.

There have been **three serious workplace accidents in our industry in recent days**, one fatal, one resulting in a leg being amputated and one with fingers crushed by a post knocker. These incidents sharpen the focus on working safely, and it is important for everyone in the industry to refresh on the use of safe operating procedures. No one goes to work expecting to be injured and we should remind ourselves how easy it is to be distracted, lose attention or work unsafely because we are unfamiliar with a task or machine. Our thoughts are with those who have been injured or have lost someone through injury.

SAWIA is developing education and training materials that will assist wine companies to identify and sharpen their points of difference. In addition SAWIA will be providing some export orientated courses for new and existing exporters. Understanding the cultural and business differences between Australia and China will be essential if a successful market presence for the South Australian wine industry is to be achieved. Shortly, I will be announcing the dates for these courses which are being developed with funding provided by the State Government Market Development Program.

Paid Parental Leave & Long Service Leave Seminars

SAWIA regional seminars in May and June will help you to answer questions such as:

- Who is entitled to Parental Leave Pay, and who/what determines the entitlement?
- How does Parental Leave Pay impact superannuation payments and other leave entitlements?

- What do employers need to do to be reimbursed for Parental Leave Pay?
- Do you know the recent changes to calculating Long Service Leave entitlements?
- When must employers allow staff to take Long Service Leave?
- Can employees cash out Long Service Leave?
- What constitutes continuity of service?
- What records need to be kept for both types of leave?

The Paid Parental Leave Scheme commenced on 1 January 2011, and **from 1 July 2011 all employers will be responsible for paid parental leave payments to their eligible employees** – are you ready?

Long Service Leave requires a detailed understanding of recent changes to calculating employee entitlements for part-timers and casuals, including the “tricks” and traps” that often cause mistakes.

Fair Work Ombudsman audit results

Results of the Fair Work Ombudsman Wine Industry Audit have now been released, offering a valuable insight into compliance with record keeping and pay slip obligations in the industry.

In November 2010 the Fair Work Ombudsman (FWO) conducted the McLaren Vale/ Barossa Valley Winery Audit Program. A total of 71 businesses were visited by Fair Work Inspectors, however only 62 were audited due to 9 businesses not having any employees. Fair Work Inspectors also took the opportunity to speak with employers about Commonwealth workplace laws and to provide relevant educational materials.

The audit found that some businesses were unaware of and/or non-compliant with the minimum pay slip and record keeping requirements. However, all businesses subsequently committed to bringing their practices in line with the *Fair Work Regulations 2009*. All contraventions were voluntarily rectified.

Packaging Covenant Mentor Program receives major boost

SAWIA is delighted to report that the Australian Packaging Covenant has approved a major funding boost to take SAWIA's Mentor Program to a whole new level. This will mean even greater assistance and substantial cost savings for members!

The benefits for participants in the Mentor Program include:

- Reducing the compliance effort for businesses of all size
- Obtaining support from industry specific tools developed by SAWIA and Mentor Program participants

- SAWIA submitting one action plan on behalf of all participants
- SAWIA collating and submitting an Annual Report on behalf of all participants
- Collective information gathering from suppliers, with SAWIA gathering the information required to meet the sustainable packaging guidelines
- Receiving ongoing support and guidance, including the benefits of networking with other participants
- Opportunities to attend SAWIA workshops and forums to share information and address packaging challenges as a group.

Best of all, currently there is no cost to participate in the mentor program.

Prior to June 2010, the Australian Packaging Covenant (APC) was the National Packaging Covenant (NPC). In conjunction with the name change there was a transformation to the Covenants objectives and the reporting requirements from Signatories. The new Mentor Program funding will assist in improving the benefits for participants and encouraging more businesses to participate.

Gramp Hardy Smith Memorial Prize



SAWIA is delighted to announce that Gregory Michael Lane has won the 2010 Gramp Hardy Smith Memorial Prize for the most outstanding student graduating from either viticulture or oenology at the University of Adelaide. Gregory completed his Bachelor of Oenology with First Class Honours, gaining 15 High Distinctions and 10 Distinctions.

The Gramp Hardy Smith Memorial Prize was established in 1938 by the South Australian Wine Industry Association as an annual prize to commemorate the lives of three prominent members, Messrs H Gramp, TM Hardy and S Hill Smith, who were tragically killed in a plane crash on 25 October of that year on their way to represent the industry in Canberra.

The Prize is awarded each year with the ongoing support of Accolade Wines (Hardy Wine Company), Pernod Ricard Pacific and Yalumba Wine Company.

SAWIA is also very pleased to announce that the South Australian Wine Industry Association Silver medal for the second highest aggregate score was awarded to Brooke Tegan Howell. Brooke is now working at the Yalumba Wine Company (long-time SAWIA member).

The Prize Ceremony was brought forward this year to 18 April in order to align with the 19 April Graduation ceremony at the University of Adelaide.

INDUSTRY & GOVERNMENT

Liquor Licensing Draft Code of Practice released

SAWIA advises members that a number of proposed changes were incorporated into the *Liquor*

Licensing (Miscellaneous) Amendment Bill 2011 and Draft Code of Practice that have been released by the State Government.

Following our submission in September, there still remain key areas of concern with the proposals. In particular, the Responsible Service of Alcohol training requirement proposes exemption provisions for some wine producers but other producers will need to make application to gain exemption from the training requirement. SAWIA is of the strong view that the imposition of a further layer of red tape by the Liquor Licensing Office should be avoided by including the specific inclusion of the types of businesses that will be exempt – which should cover the majority of wine producers.

By way of background, SAWIA members may recall that the State Government released two discussion papers in July 2010 covering how to deal with anti-social behaviour, alcohol related crime and what should be contained in a Code of Practice. In response, SAWIA made a strong submission arguing for the need to minimise red tape and retain the hard won gains that SAWIA had achieved for the wine industry in recent years.

The Government tabled a Bill in Parliament and issued a Draft Code of Practice in April 2011 for consultation. Following this, SAWIA issued a Notice to Members on 15 April that summarised the content of the Bill and the impact of the Draft Code. This Notice is available from the Noticeboard of the Liquor Licensing page of SAWIA's [website](#). SAWIA members are strongly encouraged to consider the impact of the proposed changes on your business.

Agricultural land protection

Following on from past newsletters, SAWIA welcomes comment from members with regard to the South Australian Government's Proposed Land Protection Bill. The key issues include:

- What is it about your wine region and community that you value, want maintained/enhanced?
- Why is it of value?
- How should agricultural land that is to be preserved or protected be identified?
- What are the defining characteristics for protection?
- Should there be additions or changes to the initial principles and objectives set out in the paper distributed by SAWIA to members in early April?

As members should already be aware, SAWIA has been advocating strongly for legislation to protect wine grape growing areas from inappropriate development. The South Australian Government's recent announcement that it will draft legislation to protect wine regions is an important step in the right direction.

SAWIA will continue to work collaboratively with the regions to press for appropriate legislation that protects all wine grape growing regions around the state. As this is a very important issue for our industry, members are strongly encouraged to contact the association to discuss what they value and why it should be protected.

EMPLOYEE RELATIONS & OHSW

SAWIA represents members - National OHS Work Safety Laws

SAWIA, on behalf of members, has made an important submission to Safe Work Australia on the draft "Model" Work Health and Safety Regulations and priority Codes of Practice. The new laws will ensure uniform work health and safety standards are in place throughout Australia, and have significant implications for South Australian employers.

SAWIA has strongly represented members, highlighting key areas of concern including the proposed:

- Introduction of an extensive range of "infringement notice" offences
- Right of Entry provisions available to unions (which are not necessary as those rights are already provided for under the *Fair Work Act 2009*)
- Workplace management measures relating to temporary workplaces, personal protective equipment and emergency plans
- Changes to the definition of a "confined space" and seeking greater clarity about what is considered "adequate" training for workers required to work in confined spaces
- Recommendations that additional guidance material related to management of "contractor safety" and employer and employee obligations should be developed.

More than 1,300 public submissions were made to Safe Work Australia on the model Regulations and priority Codes of Practice. Safe Work Australia is currently reviewing the submissions and SAWIA expects that the final model WHS Regulations package will be tabled at the next Workplace Relations Ministers' Council meeting in June 2011. The federal government has a target date of 1 January 2012 for commencement of the new legislation.

SA wine industry stars in OHS Safety and Induction DVD



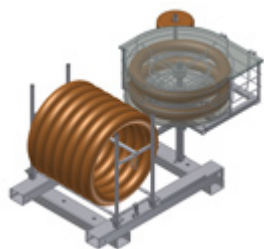

Vehicle Mounted Wire Spinner



The Vehicle Mounted Wire Spinner Project is now at "sign off" stage with the drawings and Standard Operating Procedure nearing completion. SAWIA members will recall that we have been working on developing engineering drawings and a Standard Operating Procedure for a Vehicle Mounted Wire Spinner, designed to eliminate manual handling of heavy wire coils when undertaking fencing and trellising.

Funding for this project has been provided by Employers Mutual Limited (SAWIA's wine industry sponsor).

Spent Convictions Act 2009

The *Spent Convictions Act 2009 (SA)* came into force on 13 February 2011. Only convictions that are not "spent" will show up if you undertake a national criminal history check in relation to an existing or prospective employee. This means that, after a certain time period, a criminal history check will not necessarily reveal certain past convictions.

Equal opportunity for women in the workplace

In March 2011 a detailed reform package was announced for the *Equal Opportunity for Women in the Workplace Act and Agency*. The *Equal Opportunity for Women in the Workplace Act 1999* will be renamed the *Workplace Gender Equality Act*, and the *Equal Opportunity for Women in the Workplace Agency* will also be renamed, to become the *Workplace Gender Equality Agency*.

Further details about the implementation of this reform will be announced in the coming months and amending legislation will be introduced in 2011.

Business Groups have stated their support of gender equity principles, but have questioned the red tape burden that the new framework will impose on employers.

Fatigue – Managing workplace risk

Fatigue has been highlighted in the press as a contributing factor to a number of recent road accident fatalities. This is important to the wine industry because employees often travel long distances by motor vehicle to work or home after work. Sometimes this travel can be after working long shifts, particularly during vintage.

Employers should provide employees with options to reduce fatigue, which could include more breaks during long shifts or ensuring employees are adequately rested prior to starting the journey home.

As members should be aware, the *Code of Practice - Working Hours* came into operation on 1 July 2010. The Code was developed in recognition that excessive working hours, in particular fatigue, may pose a significant risk to the health, safety and welfare of South Australian workers and their families.

Important trademark update

The logo for Finlaysons, featuring the word "FINLAYSONS" in a serif font.

Well over 100 trademarks registered or pending in Australia for wine (or spirits) feature a kangaroo or wallaby image. Is it still safe to label your product using one of our national symbols? Or has the industry become so crowded with such trademarks that a new kangaroo or wallaby label inevitably risks infringing?

Perhaps the most recognisable marsupial trademark is the wallaby that adorns Yellow Tail wines. Casella Wines has now moved to protect this image in the US Federal Court. The outcome of this dispute may have substantial implications for branding of Australian wine, particularly for export.

Finlaysons Lawyers (SAWIA's Wine Industry Partner) has prepared a summary of the matters that will be considered in this case, with important implications for wine producers when designing new wine labels. 2011 South Australian Winegrape Utilisation and Pricing Survey

Make sure you participate in the 2011 South Australian Winegrape Utilisation and Pricing Survey! SAWIA members should now have received the 2011 data collection forms, which should be completed and returned to the Phylloxera and Grape Industry Board of South Australia as soon as possible.

The Survey will help winemakers and grapegrowers answer a range of important questions about crush information, grape prices, vineyard area and future estimated production.

The survey is published annually with historical price and tonnage information available back to 1992.
