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### **Message from the Chief Executive**

In recent days, certain activity within the industry has served as a timely reminder to members of the importance of complying with regulatory obligations. The government makes laws and then seeks to monitor compliance through in-field inspections that often require businesses to produce appropriate supporting documentation. While requests for documentation can be inconvenient due to vintage, travel or other reasons, it is still necessary to comply with these obligations.

In other industries substantial fines have recently been imposed because employers have failed to observe the conditions of an industrial instrument, did not provide a safe system of work (resulting in injury, accident or incident) or failed to comply with an environmental condition imposed under its licence. Not only are the penalties imposed substantial, an order may apply to “right the wrong” and the issue may be aired in the media providing the wrong type of advertising! If you have any concerns or issues, please contact SAWIA staff to discuss the matter.

Now that vintage is almost complete, SAWIA staff will soon be visiting regions to see members and deliver training sessions on the important changes required under the new Industrial Relations laws. If you would like a site visit, please contact us to arrange a suitable time.

There has been recent media regarding grape vines planted as Albarino and whether they are in fact a different variety. There has also been concern about this issue voiced by members. Refer to the Noticeboard of the Members Home page of SAWIA's [website](#) for an information sheet prepared by the CSIRO, clarifying the source of material, its distribution and how vines can be tested to confirm their true identity.

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### Fair Work Act 2009 – Important June seminars

*NB: The following article applies only to constitutional corporations covered by the Federal Industrial Relations system (Workplace Relations Act 1996).*

SAWIA will be conducting important regional seminars to help wine producers and grapegrowers understand and apply the new federal system of industrial relations. The Fair Work Act has been passed by Parliament, and is being implemented in two stages on 1 July 2009 and 1 January 2010. The Act has far reaching implications for most businesses in Australia.

From 1 July 2009, new laws covering unfair dismissal, good faith bargaining and expanded union rights of entry to workplaces will commence. Fair Work Australia, a "one-stop shop" for advice and support on all workplace relations issues and enforcement of legal entitlements, also becomes operational on that date. Other key aspects of the Act will become operational on 1 January 2010, including the 10 National Employment Standards (that will replace the current five Australian Fair Pay and Conditions Standards) and the introduction of modern awards.

In order to complete the transition from "WorkChoices" to the new federal industrial relations system, a further two bills will need to be passed that deal with the transition from the current system to the new Fair Work regime, plus consequential amendments to other federal laws. The government hopes to have both of these Bills passed by mid-June at the latest, following another Senate inquiry. There will also need to be new regulations and tribunal rules.

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#### Award Modernisation Process update

*NB: The following article applies only to constitutional corporations covered by the Federal Industrial Relations system (Workplace Relations Act 1996).*

SAWIA has taken the lead for the national wine industry in strongly advocating a modern wine industry award with its own terms and conditions, and opposing the inclusion of the wine industry into any other manufacturing type award. This is in response to the Federal Labor Government's Award Modernisation Process, being undertaken by the Australian Industrial Relations Commission (AIRC), which seeks to significantly reduce and simplify the number of awards operating across Australia.

Following on from a number of submissions and appearances before the AIRC over the past year, SAWIA has more recently:

- § lodged a written submission on 6 March that included a copy of a draft modern award
- § appeared before the AIRC on 16 March in support of that submission
- § submitted a proposed award classification structure on 27 March
- § lodged a supplementary submission on 9 April to support the creation of a modern wine industry award.

This process is very intensive and has commanded a large investment of SAWIA's resources to meet the AIRC's strict deadlines throughout the process.

SAWIA's concerns about the increase in employer costs associated with award modernisation are shared across a wide range of industries. In the South Australian wine industry, reducing six state and one federal award into one national award potentially creates significant cost pressures. For example, SAWIA is concerned about the impact of the proposal for casual loading to move from 20% to 25%.

SAWIA will be closely reviewing the Exposure Draft Award when it is released in late May 2009, and will continue to strongly represent the industry in order to achieve the best possible outcome. As part of this process, SAWIA will address the Full Bench of the AIRC in June regarding the industry's issues and concerns, well before the final content of the modern award is released in September. Any transitional arrangements, minimising the impact of increases, are then expected to be addressed during the fourth quarter of 2009.

Modern awards currently have a start date of 1 January 2010 so the timeline is extremely tight with regard to their implementation. SAWIA will be offering a range of training seminars and courses to provide information that will help members update payroll systems, employment documentation and the other matters that will need to be addressed.

Of note, modern awards for other occupations (clerical, maintenance, hospitality etc) are in the process of being (or have been) determined. However, importantly not one modern award has been finalised at this point.

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Australian Wine Carbon Calculator now available!



SAWIA and the Winegrape Council of South Australia, through the Wine Industry Sector Agreement, have worked with the Winemakers' Federation of Australia to jointly develop the Australian Wine Carbon Calculator. The calculator has been specifically designed for the Australian wine industry, and can be downloaded (free) from the Resources section of the Climate Change Sector Agreement page of SAWIA's [website](#).

The calculator was developed based on the International Wine Carbon Calculator and Protocol v1.2, which was released a number of years ago. The Australian Wine Carbon Calculator incorporates a range of improvements from user feedback about the International Calculator. The Australian calculator also reflects the Australian Government's legislation that requires large companies to report their greenhouse gas emissions and energy use, using the data emission factors that are specific to Australian conditions (e.g., emissions from Australian motor vehicles). This approach ensures relevance and consistency for all Australian wine industry businesses calculating their carbon footprint.

The Australian Wine Carbon Calculator has enhanced usability, with greater transparency showing the specific emissions factors used in calculations. The calculator also contains clear instructions and notes on each spreadsheet, and is supported by a comprehensive User Guide to assist data entry.

The Australian Wine Carbon Calculator will be used to calculate and report greenhouse gas emissions for participants in the Wine Industry Sector Agreement. Two rounds of regional workshops will be held around the state to provide hands on assistance with using the calculator. The first workshops during August and September 2009 will help participants to collect the data needed to calculate emissions over the 2009/10 year. Over half the wine production in South Australia has already committed to the Sector Agreement, so make sure your business is not left behind! The *Wine Industry Sector Agreement - Climate Change and Greenhouse Emissions Reduction* is a two year project to inform the wine industry of issues surrounding climate change, while encouraging and assisting industry to measure and report their carbon footprint. The South Australian Wine Industry Association and the Wine Grape Council of South Australia signed the Sector Agreement with the State Government in accordance with the *Climate Change and Greenhouse Emissions Reduction Act 2007*.

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## Important Insurance update

### Credit insurance market update



Major changes are occurring in the credit insurance market according to National Credit Insurance (NCI), SAWIA's wine industry partner. This has become even more important as exporters increasingly rely on credit insurance in response to the global economic crisis.

On the back of rapidly climbing insurance claims in the second half of 2008, in February 2009 NCI experienced the highest level of claims (total across all industries) in the 25 years it has been brokering credit insurance.

In response to the global recession, and the high cost of claims incurred, insurers are reviewing buyers, markets and policy structures. It has become increasingly difficult to secure or renew credit insurance, with large increases to insurance rates and minimum annual premiums in the face of greatly diminished competition. These changes have been happening at a rapid pace, and in some cases at very short notice.

In early April, NCI wrote to SAWIA members that are insured through NCI, detailing some of the challenges in the credit insurance marketplace and highlighting some of the potential changes for 2009/10 renewals. NCI is now meeting with a range of potential insurers to ensure the best possible terms are available to members of the association for 2009/10.

### State of the insurance industry



In addition to the dramatic changes happening to the credit insurance market in the past few months, insurers have also been busy "talking up" the rest of the insurance market. According to MGA Insurance Brokers (SAWIA's wine industry partner), insurance companies are targeting a 10% increase in premiums.

Insurers use investment returns to supplement their insurance premiums and help fund their administration costs and claims payouts. Large claims for the insurance industry in the past few years include:

- § Cyclone Larry - \$540 million (North Qld, March 2006)
- § Flooding - \$1.5 billion (NSW, June 2007)
- § Storms \$415 million (NSW, Dec 2007)
- § Storms - \$310 million (SE Qld, Nov 2008)
- § Flooding - \$342 million (North Qld, Dec 2008)
- § Victoria bushfires - \$1.12 billion (Vic, Feb 2009).

These losses have been exacerbated by decreased interest rates, lower investment returns, increased insolvency and unemployment, increased fraud, higher re-insurance rates and reduced company turnover. To make matters worse, the Global Economic Crisis means that insurers have had to focus on protecting profitability, capital and credit ratings. This translates into higher insurance premiums across the industry.

While so far these increases have yet to occur, MGA expect that business insurance premiums will rise by Christmas. SAWIA members are encouraged to be proactive, and discuss insurance coverage and requirements with your insurance broker.

In this market you should be reviewing all insurances for their cost effectiveness, and presenting a business to insurers that is seen as well operated and proactive in risk management. Consider alternative options such as increased policy excesses, self insurance in certain areas and ensure that all information supplied to insurers (e.g., turnover, replacement values) is accurate.

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## EMPLOYEE RELATIONS & OHSW

Do your workers have a valid visa to work in Australia?

*NB: This article applies to all wine industry employers.*

SAWIA Members are reminded that, since 19 August 2007 it has been an offence under the Migration Act 1958 to knowingly or recklessly allow a worker to work, or refer a worker for work, where that worker is someone from overseas who is either illegally in Australia or is working in breach of their visa conditions.

There are serious consequences, including fines and imprisonment, for employers, labour hire companies, employment agencies and anyone who allows an illegal worker(s) to work or refers illegal workers for work.

The Department of Immigration and Citizenship (DIAC) has made it easy for employers to quickly verify that the employee concerned has a valid visa to work via:

- § DIAC's Visa Entitlement Verification Online (VEVO) website service at [www.immi.gov.au/vevo](http://www.immi.gov.au/vevo)
- § DIAC's toll-free Visa Entitlement Verification Faxback Service (phone 1800 040 070 to find out more about using the service).

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### Employer obligations for sponsored workers

*NB: This article applies to all wine industry employers.*

With the economic downturn, employers are reminded of important obligations with regard to sponsored workers, including 457 visa holders.

Employers who are sponsors (or potential sponsors) of visa holding workers are reminded of the obligation to:

- § Meet the cost of return travel for an employee (and accompanying family members) to their home country
- § Pay all medical or hospital expenses for an employee (and accompanying family members) for treatment in a public hospital (other than expenses met by health insurance or reciprocal health care arrangements)
- § Repay the Australian Government any money it spends as a result of the employee's stay in Australia.

Costs may include those relating to locating and detaining the employee (and accompanying family member) if they become unlawful, removing them from Australia and processing any application for a protection visa.

Past experience has shown that medical costs can be considerable, particularly where there may be a pre-existing condition and insurance is not available. While the sponsored employee is obligated to have medical coverage for their family, employers should verify the coverage to minimise risk of exposure. Of note, there are reciprocal arrangements for medical costs with some countries, and medical insurance coverage may also be recognised.

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## New unfair dismissal laws

*NB: The following article applies only to constitutional corporations covered by the Federal Industrial Relations system (Workplace Relations Act 1996).*

Important new unfair dismissal laws will apply from 1 July 2009 under the new Fair Work Act 2009. Under the new laws, an employee is protected from unfair dismissal provided that at the time when the employee was given notice of dismissal, or when the dismissal actually takes effect (whichever happens first), the employee was:

- § Employed for at least 6 months (or 12 months in the case of a "small business") AND
- § Covered by a modern award or enterprise agreement or paid an annual rate of pay below the "high income threshold" (set by regulation - expected to be \$100,000 for full-time employees or pro rata for part-timers, indexed from 27 August 2007).

For unfair dismissal purposes, small business will be defined as fewer than 15 "full-time equivalent employees" from 1 July 2009. The definition will revert to fewer than 15 employees on a headcount basis from 1 January 2011.

Under the current Workplace Relations Act 1996, employers with fewer than 100 employees have been exempt from unfair dismissal laws. This means that, from 1 July 2009, a significant number of employers will be subject to unfair dismissal laws and may need to review termination processes.

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## Are alternative work arrangements legal?

*NB: This article applies to all South Australian wine industry employers.*

What options, other than termination of employment and redundancy, are available to employers who want to retain staff but also maintain or reduce labour costs?

This is a question many businesses are pondering in the face of the global financial crisis, a looming recession and rising unemployment. Even the Prime Minister has been urging employers to "do their utmost to protect workers from dismissal".

Some strategies that employers can explore include:

- § Reducing hours of work
- § Limiting pay increases
- § Reducing accrued annual and long service leave
- § Limiting bonuses.

However, employers need to comply with a range of legal requirements when implementing these changes. For detailed

### Environment Conference – Key speakers confirmed



Brian Croser will open the 5th Australian Wine Industry Environment Conference on 23 September 2009 at the National Wine Centre. Managing natural resources, reducing carbon emissions and climate change will be common themes throughout the conference, with a focus on helping the industry to address environmental challenges and compete successfully in the international marketplace.

Dr Tom Hatton (CSIRO Director, Water for a Healthy Country Flagship) will make an important presentation on the Sustainable Yields Project, estimating the current and likely future water availability in each catchment/aquifer and for the entire Murray-Darling Basin, while considering climate change and other risks, surface-groundwater interactions and water availability to meet extractive use.

Robert Freeman (Chief Executive of the Murray-Darling Basin Authority and Former Chief Executive of the South Australian Department of Water, Land and Biodiversity Conservation) will address Water Security including the right of farmers to get ground water, and what the future holds for irrigators on the river and in catchment areas.

Steve Tyerman (The University of Adelaide's Wine Industry Professor of Viticulture) will focus on the Future of Viticulture, Wine and Climate Change, regarding opportunities to adapt or even take advantage of climate change. Steve will assess practical adaptation options for managing the impacts and developing innovative agricultural practices.

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### Water update

The latest River Murray Water Resources Report highlighted that:

- § River Murray irrigation allocations in South Australia will remain at 18% for the remainder of 2008-09 as extreme drought conditions continue across the Murray-Darling Basin
- § The volume of water in upstream storages is currently 1,305 GL (14% capacity), compared to the long-term average for mid-April of about 5,020 (54% capacity)
- § Just 40 GL of inflows were recorded in March 2009, only slightly above the worst case scenario predictions
- § Below Lock 1 water levels remain low and salinity levels remain high due to reduced flows into South Australia.

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### Water trade price report / trading deadlines

Waterfind has reported that the average price of temporary water in the southern Murray-Darling Basin during March was \$295 per megalitre, an increase of \$15 per megalitre since the previous month. Since late March, temporary water has traded for around the \$350/ML mark.

The March and start of April allocation announcements brought little change in the volume available to growers across the

southern Murray-Darling Basin, with the Goulburn system being the only one to receive an increase (+2%) during this period. All other Victorian, New South Wales and South Australian allocations remain unchanged.

Water trading application deadlines include:

- § From late May, water markets across the southern Murray-Darling Basin will begin closing, with Murray Irrigation Limited in New South Wales the first of the major Murray-connected markets to close
- § By the end of May, all New South Wales markets in the southern Basin will be closed to temporary trading, with the exception of Western Murray Irrigation and Murrumbidgee Irrigation, where internal trading will remain open until mid June
- § Victoria's Goulburn-Murray Water and Lower Murray Water have asked that all interstate trades be submitted by 2 June, and by 16 June elsewhere within Victoria
- § In South Australia, temporary trading will close for the season on 30 June.

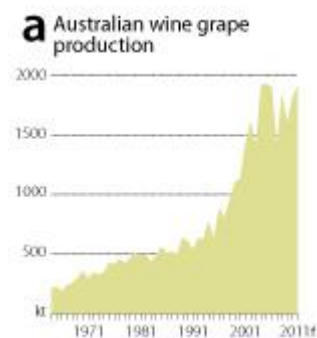

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### Australian Winegrape Production Projections to 2010-11 released



Total Australian winegrape production is forecast to fall by 13% to 1.6MT in 2008–09 as a result of ongoing shortages of water for irrigation and high temperatures in early 2009, according to the new ABARE report [Australian Winegrape Production Projections to 2010/11](#).

While many regions faced difficult growing conditions, yields in many regions of Victoria were also reduced by the bushfires in that State, as smoke taint damaged grapes and some vineyards were destroyed.

According to the report, Shiraz is expected to remain the highest volume variety produced in Australia in the coming years. Chardonnay is expected to be the next highest, followed by Cabernet Sauvignon. Collectively, these three varieties are forecast to account for around 60% of total Australian winegrape production in 2008–09.

In 2009–10, assuming water availability for irrigation improves and there are no extreme weather events, production is projected to increase to 1.8MT as yields are assumed to return to historical averages. This trend is projected to continue with forecast wine grape production of 1.9 million tonnes in 2010–11.

Wine stocks to sales ratios are expected to increase in the next few years as production growth is expected to outstrip sales growth. Deteriorating economic conditions and strong competition in key export markets are the main factors behind the expected slowdown in wine sales in the coming years.

The 14th Australian Wine Industry Technical Conference is scheduled for 3-8 July 2010 in Adelaide. The program will include both local and international speakers, covering all aspects of grape and wine production from the vineyard to the consumer.
